2024 FEATURED GUESTS

KATIE ERNST AND TWIN TALK

While reedist Dustin Laurenzi, bassist-singer Katie Ernst, and drummer Andrew Green are deeply rooted in jazz tradition, they've spent their time on the band stage together making their music more elastic, spontaneous, and open, embracing new inspirations without stifling the improvisational heart of their work. All three musicians are active members in the city's bustling jazz community, each playing in numerous working bands, but they've found a true collective voice as Twin Talk. They've used live performances as opportunities to stretch—expanding on composed material and ditching set lists in favor of calling tunes on the fly—but on their latest album *Weaver* they've pushed themselves further than ever, using the recording studio as a place for experimentation, letting a new batch of compositions develop and take new shapes. As critic Howard Reich wrote recently in the *Chicago Tribune*, "These musicians listen keenly to one another, and with a sensitivity that only comes from familiarity and trust."





DR. SAMUEL YATES

Dr. Yates is a deaf artist and researcher who is resident dramaturg and Assistant Professor of Theatre at Pennsylvania State University. Their writing on topics such as disability aesthetics in the performance, the triplethreat as an economic unit for Broadway musicals, theatrical accessibility practices, and pedagogy are published or forthcoming in numerous journals and publications including The Journal of Dramatic Theory and Criticism, Music Theatre Today, Studies in Musical Theatre, and Medicine and Literature. Samuel's current monograph project, Cripping Broadway: Producing Disability in the American Musical, concerns disability aesthetics and accessibility practices in Broadway musicals, and asks how our notions of disability and the able body inform and transform theatrical performance. As a dramaturg, they have collaborated with companies such as the Abbey Theatre, Woolly Mammoth, The Huntington, the Eugene O'Neill Theater Center, The Samuel Beckett Centre, and Gala Hispanic Theatre. Beyond the stage, Samuel has worked as an arts and accessibility consultant with Gensler Architecture, the NEA, and 3Arts Chicago. Dr. Yates will hold a student workshop about disability in performance, as well as a public presentation and facilitated discussion about accessibility and performance.

STUDIO ALLUVIUM

Mitch Iburg and Zoë Powell are ceramic artists who have dedicated their careers to working with locally sourced clay and mineral resources. Through the years, they've been able to research clays from across the United States: Iowa, Virginia, New York, California, Minnesota, Vermont, Alaska, and Oklahoma.

They each produce a wide range of work, from functional tea and sake ware to expressive vessels and sculptural objects. In all their work, Mitch and Zoë share a general ethos of experimentation and collaboration with the natural world.

In 2018 they opened Studio Alluvium, a ceramics studio based in Saint Paul, Minnesota. This studio isn't just a place for them to create their work- it functions as a space for them to share their research with the world. Through in-person and online workshops, Mitch and Zoë have taught over 700 students from 45 different countries. Their mission is to continue sharing their values of sustainability, experiential learning, and curiosity for the Earth and its resources.


KATIE ERNST & TWIN TALK CONCERT






STUDIO ALLUVIUM GEOLOGY HIKE




