JPC guidelines instruct candidates to present and contextualize the evidence of teaching quality from the four distinct sources numbered below. This worksheet is provided to JPC committee members in order to encourage a multi-method approach to assessing teaching effectiveness. Candidates should not view the worksheet as a check sheet, but rather as a guide to the types of evidence that help create a strong portfolio overall.
