

Library Jeopardy: Know the Question; Libraries Have Answers

Library Jeopardy Host's Manual

1. In the **Library Jeopardy Game Folder**, open **index.html** Divide the class into teams of about 6-8 members each.
2. Ask each team to pick a scorekeeper. Each scorekeeper will record the scores of *all* teams.
3. The host determines which team will go first, then each team gets a turn in the order determined by the host.
4. The team awarded play chooses a category and dollar amount for which they wish to attempt to provide the correct question after an answer is displayed. There is no specified order for choosing categories or dollar amounts.
5. Before declaring their question for the answer, teams must make sure that all team members are in agreement!
6. If the team provides the correct question within the 10-15 second time frame allotted, they "earn" the dollar amount associated with the answer and question.
7. If one team provides the wrong question, other teams are given a chance to provide the correct one before the play goes to another team. However, no team loses their "earnings" due to an incorrect question.
8. Daily Double: There is one daily double. When chosen, all teams decide on a dollar amount that they will earn if they provide the correct question. When all teams have recorded their dollar amount, the answer is displayed, and the teams *write down* their question. When the time is called, a team member from each team reads the question. Any team providing the correct question earns the amount previously recorded.
9. After all answers have been selected, all teams are the winners of new information about their library! However, if the host wishes to provide a piece of candy for Library Jeopardy players, they may.
10. **IMPORTANT:** When the game is over, be sure and clear the cache and history of your Internet Browser! (In Internet Explorer: Tools > Internet Options > Clear History.)
