The "Think Pink" initiative is a global, unified effort for the WBCA's nation of coaches to assist in raising breast cancer awareness on the court, across campuses, in communities and beyond.

Artifact show planned at La Crosse's Valley View Mall Holmen-area dig highlighted in annual exhibit

Artifacts from last year's excavation in the Holmen area will be featured in an upcoming show at Valley View Mall in La Crosse.

The Mississippi Valley Archaeology Center at the UW-L holds its annual Artifact Show from 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Saturday, March 1,

in Center Court of the mall. The show is free and open to the public.

Along with the recent finds, private collections of up to 20 regional collectors will be on display. Their artifacts include pottery, arrow and spear heads, along with other artifacts from throughout the Coulee Region.

Joe Tiffany, MVAC executive director, says those attending will be able to see a wide range of artifacts from collections dating from the time of the French Fur Trade back to Native American artifacts from about 10,000 years ago.

Another feature of the Artifact Show will be free artifact identification. Those with possible artifacts can bring objects in to have them identified by professional archaeologists from the Mississippi Valley Archaeology Center. "Frequently, it is possible to tell how old an artifact is, which culture made it, and even where the material to make the artifact originally came from," notes Tiffany. Appraisals of the value of artifacts cannot be made.

MURPHY LIBRARY NOTES

La Crosse Tribune options

As most local newspapers, the La Crosse Tribune does not maintain its own index or comprehensive archive for public use. They do have a Web-archives search tool at their Web site, but it does not search through a comprehensive, historical index. People looking for articles in the La Crosse Tribune usually need to try several sources, such as those listed here, to fully search all available content.

The Murphy Library databases referenced below, as well as other newspaper databases, can be found in the library's "Newspapers" link, which is on the home page in the "Article Databases" section.

The La Crosse Tribune is now available full text in EBSCOhost's Newspaper Source database. Consistent coverage goes from December 2005 to the present, with spotty coverage for older issues. The Tribune is also partially available in Proquest's Newspapers and Wisconsin Newsstand databases, with coverage from 1991 to the present. This coverage includes only articles that were indexed by other news agencies and, therefore, distributed beyond the immediate La Crosse area.

Image files of the Tribune going back to the early 1900's can be found in the library's NewspaperARCHIVE database

The La Crosse Public Library maintains the only local index to the La Crosse Tribune. The online index is found at the Public Library's Web site in the "Research and Reference" area and goes back to 1990, covering everything except human interest, sports and most letters to the editor. The Public Library also maintains a clipping file with actual articles from the paper. Although it contains older clippings, it is most populated with clippings from 1976 forward. The clipping file is located in the library's Archives department.

More library news

Maps and Atlases of La Crosse County and the Upper Mississippi River

Murphy Library and La Crosse Public Library have received an LSTA grant for 2008 to digitize maps and atlases of La Crosse County and the Upper Mississippi River. The grant will give access to material physically belonging to the two institutions and the Wisconsin Historical Society. The \$5,506 will allow the digitization by University of Wisconsin Digital Collections Center (UWDCC) of over 100 maps both in published and manuscript form.

This group of material includes maps and atlases of La Crosse County of a variety of types, including plat (ownership), highway, soil, topographic; city of La Crosse including zoning, parks and street; other La Crosse

County municipalities; and selected pre- and post-lock and dam charts and maps of the Upper Mississippi River. The date range of the maps is approximately 1854-1987 and will demonstrate the history of the area from the days of logging to the post-lock and dam system on the Mississippi River.

This proposal forges new boundaries by considerably increasing the amount of La Crosse resources available on the Internet. It focuses on materials that are oversize and, thus, difficult and expensive to host locally with the existing talents and equipment available and probably would not be digitized otherwise.

By grouping these materials together intellectually in a database, regardless of holding library, and sharing the best of these collections with users, everyone will benefit.

Users of all types will, therefore, be more likely to capture a solid, representative body of material that can be found in one central location on the Web that is currently not digitized.

Murphy Library and La Crosse Public Library have a long-standing, cooperative relationship in regard to the digitization of local history content. Winner of the 2005 WLA/Highsmith Award, their La Crosse History Unbound <http://lacrossehistory.org> web site has helped many faculty, students, researchers and genealogists.

Bill Doering, Murphy Library, is the metadata coordinator. Anita Taylor Doering, La Crosse Public Library, is the project manager; Vicki Tobias will be the UWDCC coordinator on this project.
