National Coming out Day at UW Eau Claire



National Coming Out Day started 29 years ago as a way to recognize the act of coming out as a radical form of activism. At UW-Eau Claire, we use National Coming Out Day as a way to celebrate LGBTQIA+ folks on campus. Should folks want to come out publicly, we give them the opportunity to do that on a stage in campus mall. However, we also recognize that for some folks, they are unable to come out publicly for fear of safety or rejection. And we honor that as well. We want students to know that no matter where they are at in their own process of identity development, that our office is here as a resource for them. We also have 35+ resource tables of different student organizations and departments on campus that are LGBTQIA+ affirming so students can identify those resources as well. We host NCOD in the middle of campus mall and hang our 30' pride flag from our student center. We want our students to see NCOD as a central part of the campus-not something that's pushed to the side but rather celebrated not only by our office, but by the institution. We know that UW-Eau Claire and every institution in the country has strides that need to be made for a wide variety of communities on college campuses so that all students feel welcome, accepted and celebrated. This event is one way that we work towards that at UWEC.
