Student presenters discussed their experiences with languages and cultures, in the classroom and abroad; attendees of the event took a "culture walk," in which they got to talk and ask questions about the presenters' research, study abroad experience, etc. Presenters also highlighted the benefits of knowing specific languages and cultures and how this prepares them for life after UWL, no matter what major/minor they completed. Two Anthropology students presented research that they conducted in Dr. Peacock's ANT 196 Introduction to Linguistic Anthropology class. *Jaelyn Roland, ARC Major/ANT Minor*, discussed her research on the changes of American perceptions of language use of South Asian characters on t.v. over the last two decades, and *Elvia Valles, ANT Minor*, presented her research called, "Two Idiomas, Mixed Cultures," which examines the everyday experiences and challenges of people who have two heritages, people who draw upon both languages and cultures in their interactions with people from both groups.
