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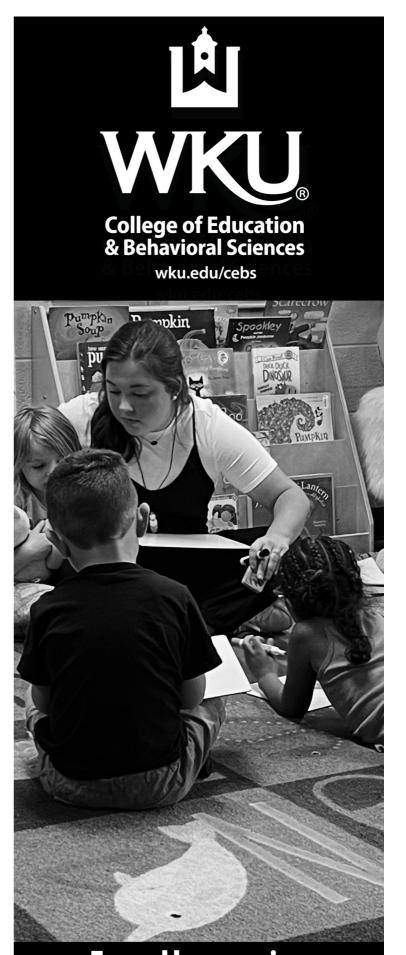
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Welcome

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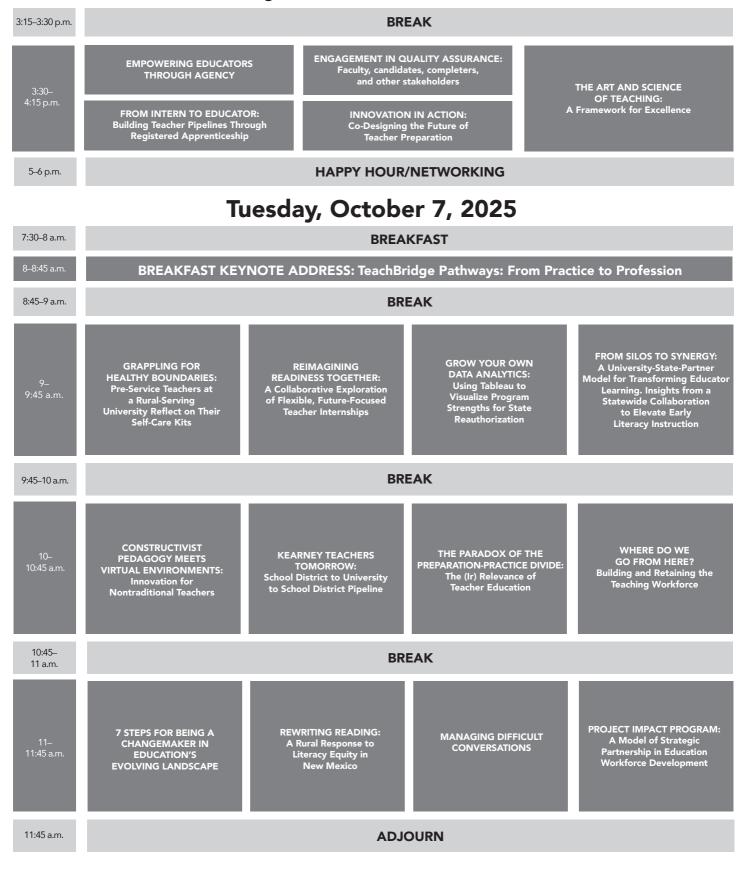

This interactive lecture summarizes and analyzes significant developments and initiatives in U.S. education, focusing on the interconnected web of recent SCOTUS rulings, federal and state legislation and policy initiatives, venture philanthropy, and social mobilization that are positioned like never before to accelerate the dismantling of public education. The presenter will share a Top Five List of what we, particularly in teacher education, should be preparing for, how we got here, and more just alternatives, along with new resources and questions for further dialogue.

This presentation examines ethical AI use in educator preparation curriculum development. Key concerns include bias, content quality, instructor autonomy, and accountability. Six principles emerged: purpose-driven design, program-specific prompts, AI-faculty partnerships, human oversight, stakeholder engagement, and transparency. Findings show ethical AI implementation requires iterative dialogue and faculty review to maintain academic integrity while leveraging efficiency.

Teaching Black: Common Eyes All See the Same

The University of Tennessee Grow Your Own Center created 16 flexible modules aligned with InTASC standards for teacher training. This online, competency-based curriculum helps Tennessee EPPs widen access to high-quality teacher preparation and supports TN's Registered Apprenticeship Program. TeachBridge Pathways will become Open Educational Resources (OER) in December 2025. The modules suit both undergraduate and post-baccalaureate programs and can be matched to any state's licensure requirements.

While self-reliance and independence have long been American ideals, especially in rural areas, expecting teachers to put the care of others first and become all things to all people is rooted in our history and philosophy with standing icons like the single teacher in a one-room schoolhouse. Analysis of end-of-term reflections of preservice teachers helps us better understand a new generation of teachers' developing ethics of care. Themes present in reflections of third- and fourth-year students suggest preservice teachers are beginning to recognize that self-care is not just superficial and egocentric, but that building strong relationships with others is vital to their ability to survive and thrive in the workforce.

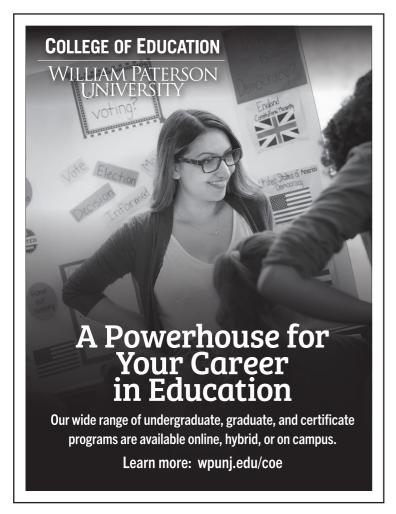

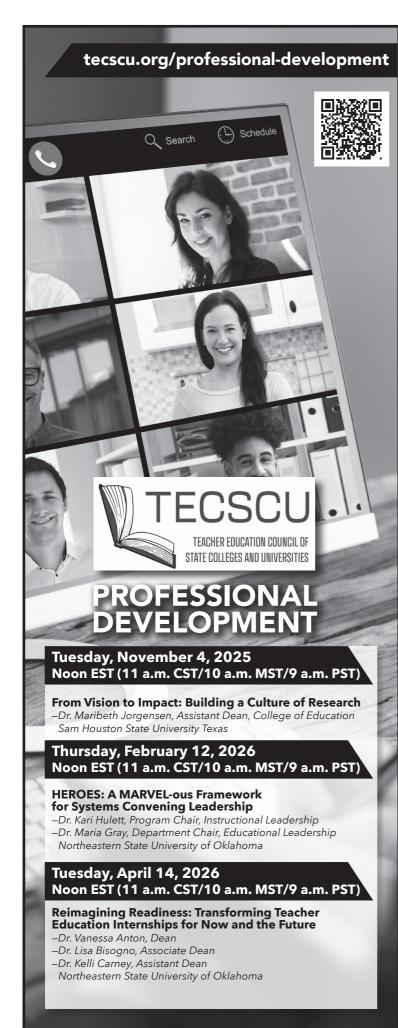
