UW-La Crosse Creates New Capstone Completion Opportunity October 2010

Background

In 2001, when UW-La Crosse was permitted the opportunity to grant an Education Specialist (EdS) degree, it was required that there would be a capstone activity. This capstone was determined to be a Specialist thesis (i.e., SPY 800 and SPY 801). While the theses produced by students have been exemplary, an alternative opportunity within the Practitioner-Scholar orientation of the program has been created. All levels of university governance have approved this option.

Actions

- The thesis option (SPY 800 *and* 801) has not changed, so students desiring to complete a traditional thesis can still do so.
- The creation of a new option (SPY 802 and 803) has been developed. The specifics are as follows:
 - SPY 802 Research/Specialist Project: This is one of two components of the capstone requirement for the Education Specialist degree. Students complete a project on an approved topic related to school psychology. Students may opt to complete:

 (a) a research project culminating a poster/presentation at an appropriate conference/outlet *or* (b) a comprehensive research proposal with an extensive literature review, in addition to a defense to a committee.

2. SPY 803 Case Conceptualization Project: This is one component of the capstone requirement for the Education Specialist degree. Students complete a written and oral presentation to a committee, defending their assessment methodology and outcomes for a child evaluated in a school setting.

Summary
