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2011 NEH Institute for Teachers

Last July, 24 teachers from all over the country came to MVAC and UW-La Crosse for a unique learning experience: a three-week Summer Institute for Teachers that explored how human cultures have adapted to the region's complex and ever-changing environments.

The teachers focused on how Native American and Euro-American peoples have adapted to the rugged landscape, challenging climate, and rich resources of the Upper Mississippi River Valley over the past 13,000 years, and how those adap-

tations keep changing even today. The Institute linked archaeology to a variety of topics and teaching areas, so participants could use the experience to take new teaching approaches back to their classrooms.

The Institute incorporated classroom discussions, demonstrations and presentations, lab studies, cleaning and cataloguing of artifacts, making an arrowhead and an arrow, and using a spear thrower. Field trips included a site excavation, visits to local Amish farms and organic growers, Effigy Mounds National Monument, a cave with Native American rock art, and other locations.

The Summer Institute - the third one MVAC and UW-La Crosse have been privileged to offer - was supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) and was one of only 19 Summer Institutes for K-12 teachers funded by NEH for 2011.

This is MVAC's 30th anniversary year. We have several events planned, and hopefully, more to follow. Upcoming on February 16, Robert Birmingham will talk on "Spirits of Earth: The Effigy Mound Landscape of Madison and the Four Lakes." Prior to the lecture, we will kick off our 30th Anniversary with our 2011 Awards Ceremony. On April 5, Jonathan Baker will present "Ancient Human Use of Aquatic Environments along the Northern Coast of the Gulf of Mexico." Also in April I will give the banquet address at the 124th meeting of the Iowa Academy of Science on the "Mississippi Valley Archaeology Center: Archaeology in Action." Later this year, Robert Palmer, United States Department of the Interior will talk on "Time Bandits and Those Who Pursue Them: A Story of Cultural Resource Theft (and Protection) in America."

We are cranking up for a busy field season with work in Onalaska and central Wisconsin. MVAC staff is also busy completing reports on several large projects from prior years.
