Under the streets we walk on every day are remnants of people who lived here a thousand years ago. MVAC — What we do:

MVAC's public awareness campaigns and educational programs help promote the preservation of significant sites and artifacts. We also work closely with municipal governments, private developers and regional Native American Tribes, particularly the Ho-Chunk Nation.

Public Presentations

Each year a variety of interesting guest speakers share their discoveries from all over the world. In addition, MVAC archaeologists travel throughout the upper Midwest giving more than 200 presentations each year.

Archaeology in Schools

We help students of all ages to better appreciate the diversity of human culture through field trips, presentations, resource materials and teacher training. This type of education prepares students to be ethical decision-makers and responsible stewards of resources for the next generation.



Summer Programs for Youth

Our hands-on approach makes the study of archaeology fun, allowing elementary and middle school students the opportunity to discover how past people lived, including how stone tools and pottery were made. Young people enjoy learning the process of archaeology and getting acquainted with the Archaeology Lab. They also have opportunities to try their hands at excavations.

Field Schools

At MVAC, we believe in learning by doing. Each year, dozens of middle and high school students, adults and teachers experience a real excavation. They spend anywhere from three days to two weeks working side by side with professional archaeologists, helping to discover and preserve the past.

Exhibits

MVAC sponsors many exhibits to teach people about the early history of the Upper Mississippi Valley. Our ongoing exhibits are located at:
