Spencer, executive director of the UW-L Alumni Association since 1998, has done much to

foster lifelong relationships between the university and its more than 60,000 alumni. Among her accomplishments: a more than 400 percent increase in association memberships since she returned to her alma mater.

Spencer, who earned a bachelor's in psychology in '85 and a master's of education in professional development in '86, was working at Gundersen Lutheran in La Crosse when the association was looking for a new executive director. After reviewing the job responsibilities, she liked the challenge. "I applied, interviewed and got the job," explains Spencer. "And here I am 10 years later and still loving it."

Over that decade, Spencer has strived to get more departments involved with alumni pro-

gramming. And, she's implemented programs to create awareness about alumni among current students.

"We want them to know what the Alumni Association is and that it's a lifetime connection to the university," explains Spencer. "These students are our future alums and our future leaders."

Among the new programs Spencer has initiated for students: Freshmen Send-Offs in numerous Midwestern cities: the Move-In Day Ice Cream Social, and the Etiquette Dinners. She's helped expand alumni clubs in Tokyo and Taipei, along with campus organizations such as ROTC, Silver Eagles, theater and Residence Life. And, she reenergized a membership committee that brought
