i. Hey everyone, I'll keep it short. Welcome to this awesome place, let's just give Larry a round of applause. He made all of this come together and really is a great place to do all of the work that we do here. Another thing, one of the shortfalls was the website. a. Bhatoya: Can we just submit any picture?

i. Schimmel: A professional picture that you have on your own would suffice but if not maybe later in the semester we could arrange pictures.

ii. Schimmel: Tyler went to DC over break and we met with a lot of folks and if we can continue to do that I think that will be really productive. We've got a lot of recognition from doing this and I think that it's a great. Two issues at the state level, the governor will reveal the budget on February 8th. I'll be watching that. The governor threw us a bone a couple of weeks ago. The governor is willing to fund the system more money but he said in the state of the union address that he wants to cut students tuition. On the surface this sounds good but I want to really see how it looks on February 8th. The state funding has been drastically cut over 30 years and that flip flopped to the state covering very little and the tuition is much higher. If we cut state dollars and tuition, then you are cutting the two main things that generate revenue for a University. Hopefully, the governor will still stand by what he said but we will find out on February 8th. I think we should wait until the governor releases the budget before we write any resolutions surrounding it. Last issue is the concealed carry debate that is still going on. There was a proposal that was supposed to happen with the concealed carry policy. I don't know when it will be coming, it might even be wrapped in the budget bill. Last year we had a survey and 60% of students said that they didn't want concealed carry on campus. So we'll obviously put whatever happens with



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concealed carry into our lobbying efforts.

i. A couple of things, comment sections in SEI's the departments that don't have them are math, CST, and biology. The last thing is the syllabus policy that went through caps and then it went to faculty senate and what we added was certain criteria with resources and grading policies and the dates of the exams. b. SA1617-028: Resolution Approving Fall 2016 Green Fund Requests

i. Garcia: So we already voted about the one on bike share but approved the garden towers. Eventually those will be around. The solar panels and the outdoor connection is still looking to get those 4 trees moved into the rec center.

a. Brever: My understanding is that the solar panels are still going through SUFAC.

ii. Tahiri: Are the tower gardens purchased already?

a. Garcia: No, I don't believe so.

iii. Burgess: Why was the approval at \$0?

a. Ames: The reason they weren't approved was because we think that if the project was really green or not. You would have to cut down the trees and get them preserved and then shipped there and back and we thought that left more of a carbon footprint.

iv. Garcia: The trees will be cut down and then taken to Madison, they are stripped of the bark and the smaller branches are cut off and it is in a

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heated room. Then there is something put on the outside of the wood. This is my remembrance of it.

a. Ames: So the request come in as 4 trees but you can choose to fund 1 tree.

b. Floerke: I think I talked about this last semester but a professor of mine told me that the carbon footprint that it leaves is a lot more than what it would be worth.

v. Kallis: How much would it cost for one tree?

a. Garcia: I think it would be around \$6000 cause there are still a decent amount of costs. There are a lot of different views on these types of projects. If people want to I could bring up the greens fund bylaws but I feel that it meets more of the priorities.

b. Ames: We voted on the tower gardens last meeting, none of this has been approved yet.

vi. Kallis: I want to add something to the document; I would like to add in the cost of the 4 trees.

a. Arney: \$9453 is what I have.

1. Halloran: Do any of you have an idea of the cost that would change with each tree?

b. Kallis: I think that it is really big advocate for making things beautiful and I think that they deserve something that they really love in that space. I have on some authority that the cost would be \$12,390.

vii. Floerke: I just think that everyone should really think if we need all 4 trees. The outdoor connection would also just need to be on board. I think that this could be an opportunity for us to get the ball rolling.

a. Ames: So the members of SUFAC had a big concern about this so there was a concern that funding a project like this would set a precedent in the future for funding more projects that are just cool to look at but are not promoting sustainability.

b. Bancker: I was just wondering if this was talked about before the cut to the green fund's budget occurred?

1. Garcia: We have \$160,000

c. Ames: There was also nothing in the proposal that showed support from the rec on this and we wanted more of an understanding of this before. That was pertaining to the solar panels.

d. Bhatoya: I think it would be cool to save the trees. viii. Tahiri: I think that just doing this project to get the word out but let's say that someone walks by the tree it could trash the legitimacy of the green fund because they took actions that weren't typically looked at as



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green.

ix. Gunaratnam: So just for some context, I think that bringing these to campus would just be another thing that would add to the University and what people know about it.

x. Kallis: The green fund doesn't really have a reputation before I was in student association. I think that this could help generate a conversation. I was wondering if anyone read the bylaws and what it was violating?

a. Quashnick: In article 2 is says that it doesn't allow trees.

1. Garcia: That was cleared up and we decided it meant outside trees.

xi. Garcia: I'm going to read you all the criteria of the bylaws.

a. Reinke: Is there an idea to put some signage around this so that people know where it comes from?

1. Garcia: Yes, that would definitely be a possibility. i. Ames: SUFAC felt that it didn't meet the

purpose of the green fund because it is to promote sustainability. On things that we cannot fund we also thought that beautification wouldn't be allowed for the green fund.

b. Lenz: I think there could be a lot of other ways to beautify the campus we don't just have to do this; I also have a question regarding the indoor/ outdoor tree.

1. Ames: Bob Hetzel doesn't want to plant more trees on campus and SUFAC just felt that we didn't need this.

xiv. Gibbins: If you look at businesses such as google, they buy land in Africa and then indigenous tribes are there and they do that so that they can say they have that, so they do bad things but they also help other people. It's beautification and you can say that it is used from the green fund and it's just a way to say that we are green friendly. Let's just say we are green friendly and move on.

a. Floerke: We could just make this pass and then we can say that senate is in support of something that the green fund does. There is no language that says beautification. This was a big part of what went into the Student Union.

xvi. Garcia: Yes, that criteria is compared with every project. There is high medium and other. It doesn't meet the sustainability piece. It is all very subjective.

XIV. Discussion

a. Student Regent nominations

i. Schimmel: the institution that governs us is the board of regents, they deal with a lot of issues that go into University's. On that board of regents there are 2 students. Basically the governor MAY select a student but he doesn't have to pick out of that pool of students. We are trying to get it to say "shall." 1. Schimmel: The person who is serving should have two years left. You don't have to come to the reps meeting to present yourself.

ii. People nominated: Kallis, Tahiri, Gibbins

3. Brever: We will give the candidates some time to think about their answers and we will hold the vote next week after they present.

b. Kallis: Do you want us to respond to the question on the application or on why we would want to be that person?

1. Brever: People should come with their half a page and prepared to talk.

b. Open senate spots

i. Brever: College of Liberal Studies, College of Science and Health, College of Business Administration, School of Arts and Communication, if we don't get these filled we can open it to an At- large seat.

a. Bhatoya: There has been a lot of talk about sanctuary campuses and we should write a resolution to be in support of that. I'm just looking for some senators to work with on this with me.

b. Tahiri: What is a sanctuary city?

1. Bhatoya: Basically, it says that they support the undocumented immigrants in the city. There was an order sent out saying that there will be a crackdown on immigrants.

i. Schimmel: There isn't a set definition of a sanctuary campus and then it would follow up with policies to help the students and people out. Providing legal support, not



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sharing data, etc.

ii. Gunaratnam: I was told that there were supposed to be gluten free options and I went to the basement today and asked for gluten free but they said that they didn't have it.
