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STUDENT-CREATED CONTENT.

GROUP WORK.

- Use <u>groups in Canvas</u> to organize students into groups or teams so they have a variety of ways to work together. This provides an asynchronous space for students to collaborate.
- Tip: Name your groups with course name so students can find them easier. Share this <u>information</u> with students about groups.
- Consider creating an open <u>Collaborate Ultra</u> (live session) meeting room where the group can work when works for them.
- Microsoft Office Online can provide options for students to co-create documents or presentations. These can be integrated in Canvas.

STUDENT PRESENTATIONS.

- Determine if you want students to present their presentations live or prerecord and then submit or share. This decision should be guided by your course and assignment objectives.
- Live student presentations can be done in a web-conferencing tool such as <u>Collaborate Ultra</u>. Provide students a chance to practice before their official presentation. Check out and share this <u>guide for students</u> from the Public Speaking Center.
- Individuals or groups can create presentations by pre-recording it using a screencast tool such as <u>MyMedia (Kaltura)</u>.
- Think about how other students should engage with the presentation of a classmate or other group. In live sessions, classmates could to be instructed to ask questions via audio or chat and the presenter(s) responds. For pre-recorded, students could share their presentation in a discussion in Canvas, and moderate that discussion when classmates post questions.
- If group presentations, provide or offer to provide a space for the group to collaborate in preparing the presentation. <u>Groups in Canvas</u> provide options for collaborative space, as well as Microsoft Office online, which can be integrated in Canvas.

STUDENT PAPERS.

- Student writing projects can be collected in Canvas assignments.
- Drafts of papers can also be collected in Canvas via a different assignment which can be graded or not.
- <u>SpeedGrader</u> is used to give comments and feedback on student papers. Be sure to offer feedback at a time in the semester when students are able to apply the feedback.
- Students can conduct peer review on papers in Canvas as well.
- Students can share final papers with other classmates in a discussion.
