

## Call 911 in an emergency. Meet reporting obligations after a situation is stabilized.

An incident may fit the definition of multiple categories. In order to meet reporting obligations, you may need to make more than one report.

Dating Violence: Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. Dating violence includes, but is not limited to, sexual or physical violence or the threat of such violence. Stalking: A course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for their safety or the safety of another; or suffer substantial emotional distress. This conduct can include directly or indirectly following, monitoring, surveilling, observing, threatening, communicating to or about a person, or interfering with a person's property.
