Situation: A participant was using the REC when they suddenly cut their arm/leg. (ERT members must create scenario tailored to service area, pick leg or arm)

Victim: Approach your friend and hold your injury indicating where the laceration happened and explain the situation to the staff member.

<u>Checklist</u> - (Facilitator/victim will verbalize bold words in parenthesis):
Grab AED, first aid kit, radio and cell phone OR radio staff to bring these items to scene using correct radio
language *
Check the scene (scene is safe)
Tell the victim you are first aid certified and want to help; obtain consent*
Assist person to a seated position
Before dealing with blood, put on gloves
Apply pressure with a clean gauze pad*
(blood is starting to soak through original gauze pad)
Apply one additional gauze pad*
(blood is soaking through the additional gauze pad)
Remove top saturated gauze pad & add additional clean gauze on top of original gauze. Press hard.
(blood is soaking through the gauze pads and is quickly pooling on the ground and victim is showing
signs of shock: pale/ashen appearance, cool/moist skin, rapid breathing)
Direct someone to call 911 and University Police*
Direct second responder to apply pressure on the wound
Ensure bystanders or other staff open doors and meet EMS
Assist person to a lying down position
Apply tourniquet to victim*
 Placed 2-3 inches above the laceration.
 Have them twist the tourniquet, but not so it cuts of circulation or is painful.
Record time that the tourniquet was applied
Monitor signs of life until EMS arrives

___What do you do after EMS has arrived and taken over? *

- Fill out an Injury/ Illness Report on Connect2
- Inform the Chain of Command ASAP (Jeff and/or Neil)
- Clean the scene with appropriate solution located in your BBP Kit/ Blood Bin
- Place all saturated materials into biohazard bag and place bag in biohazard container; place all other materials (band-aids, gauze) into a garbage can.

__What is the difference between a medical emergency and a medical incident?

- Medical Emergency: A life-threatening medical emergency involves an injury or illness that if left untreated or not identified quickly, could lead to a life-changing condition, or someone's death. These types of emergencies result in the need for advanced medical attention or the calling of an ambulance transport.
- Medical Incident: A non-life-threatening medical incident involves an injury or illness that is less severe and does not typically need more advanced medical attention. With the exception of medical needs due
